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Grade 1: Weekly Phonics Focus Lesson 2

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell **closed syllable** words with **short vowel a or nasal a**. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:

Consonants	b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z y at the beginning of a word
Vowels	a, e, i, o, u y at the end of a word
Short Vowel a	The vowel letter α represents the /ă/ sound, which is a short vowel sound.
Nasal a	Nasal a words follow the short a pattern except for one thing—the short a sound changes. The sound changes because the vowel letter a is followed by the sound /m/ or /n/.
Closed Syllables	Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or more consonants, and the vowel sound is short.

Note: A letter in slashes, such as /m/, indicates that the letter sound rather than the letter name should be said.

Here are some examples of closed syllable words with short vowel a and nasal a:

Short a (/ă/ as in apple)	Nasal a (/ăn/ as in ant)
bag	bam
bat	can
cap	ram
