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## Grade 1: Weekly Phonics Focus Lesson 3

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell closed syllable words with short vowel $i$. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:

| Consonants | $b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z$ <br> $y$ at the beginning of a word |
| :--- | :--- |
| Vowels | $a, e, i, o, u$ <br> $y$ at the end of a word |
| Short Vowel i | The vowel letter $i$ represents the /i/ sound, which is a short <br> vowel sound. |
| Closed Syllables | Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or <br> more consonants, and the vowel sound is short. |

Note: A letter in slashes, such as /m/, indicates that the letter sound rather than the letter name should be said.
Here are some examples of closed syllable words with short vowel $i$ :

| Short i <br> (/i/ as in itch) |  |
| :---: | :---: |
| dig | rig |
| fit | rim |
| fig | sit |
| hit | tip |
| kid | zip |
