

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell <u>closed syllable</u> words with <u>short vowel o</u>. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:


Consonants	b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z y at the beginning of a word
Vowels	a, e, i, o, u y at the end of a word
Short Vowel o	The vowel letter <i>o</i> represents the /ŏ/ sound, which is a short vowel sound.
Closed Syllables	Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or more consonants, and the vowel sound is short.

Note: A letter in slashes, such as /m/, indicates that the letter sound rather than the letter name should be said.

Here are some examples of closed syllable words with short vowel *o*:

Short o (/ŏ/ as in octopus)		
cot	lot	
fog	mom	
got	nod	
job	рор	
jog	sob
