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## Grade 1: Weekly Phonics Focus Lesson 7

In our classroom this week, we are learning to read and spell closed syllable words with short vowels $a, e, i, o$, or $u$. Here are the letters and patterns to practice this week:

| Consonants | b, c, $d, f, g, h, j, k, l, m, n, p, q, r, s, t, v, w, x, z$ <br> $y$ at the beginning of a word |
| :--- | :--- |
| Vowels | $a, e, i, o, u$ <br> $y$ at the end of a word |
| Closed Syllables | Closed syllable words have 1 vowel letter followed by 1 or <br> more consonants, and the vowel sound is short. |
| Closed-closed syllable words have 2 syllables and both <br> syllables follow the closed syllable pattern. |  |

Note: A letter in slashes, such as /m/, indicates that the letter sound rather than the letter name should be said.
Here are some examples of closed syllable words with short vowels $a, e, i, o$, or $u$ :

| Single Syllable, Short Vowels |  |  |  |  | Multisyllable |
| :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| Short a | Short e | Short i | Short o | Short u | Closed-Closed |
| bag | bed | big | dot | pup | catnip |
| bat | get | dig | fog | fun | kitten |
| can | leg | fit | hop | gum | laptop |
| ham | pet | sis | lot | rug | magnet |

Note: Some example words in the "Short a" column of the table above have a nasal $a$ sound instead of a short vowel $a$ sound.

Your Turn: This week, be on the lookout for closed syllable words that have short vowels $\boldsymbol{a}, \boldsymbol{e}, \boldsymbol{i}, \boldsymbol{o}$, or $\boldsymbol{u}$. In the table below, keep a list of pattern words that you read or write with your child.

| Single Syllable, Short Vowels |  |  |  | Multisyllable |  |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Short a | Short e | Short i | Short o | Short u | Closed-Closed |
